It explores the structures of languages, sociolinguistic perspectives, and the implications of language planning in educational contexts. The module provides the foundation for the subsequent modules APP and SPE; it can also be taken by students of the master's programs in "Migration, Diversität und Teilhabe" (Migration, Diversity, and Participation, module BERUF 1 und 2) and "Germanistik und Interkulturalität/Multilingualität" (Intercultural German Studies and Multilingualism, module P2).

<p>This module provides students with a comprehensive foundation in practical tools and methods that will be of strategic use in their professional and academic practice. It serves as a basis for APP and INT. Students gain valuable insights into professional fields and have the opportunity to meet expert professionals in migration, education, and diversity. They acquire practical skills in data collection, transcription, and corpus creation, and become proficient in both quantitative and qualitative research methodologies with a focus on migration research and cultural transfer. Through hands-on project work, students develop competencies in project planning, management, and evaluation. Finally, students acquire competences in diversity management by introducing them to approaches in intercultural and diversity-sensitive communication, to anti-discrimination measures, and the role of public relations in knowledge dissemination.</p> <p>It can also be taken by students of the master's programs in "Migration, Diversität und Teilhabe" (Migration, Diversity, and Participation, module METH-I) and "Germanistik und Interkulturalität/Multilingualität" (German Studies and Interculturality/Multilingualism, module P4).</p>

<p>This module introduces students to key contemporary issues in education that impact the field of migration and diversity, focusing on social justice, recognition, inclusion, and pluralism in diverse contexts. Students can explore education from global, sociological, and philosophical perspectives while also gaining practical skills in counseling, inclusive pedagogy, and digital education. The module prepares students to critically analyze and actively shape education in a socially, linguistically, and culturally diverse, digitally evolving, and globally interconnected world. The module provides the foundation for the subsequent modules SPE and APP.</p> <p>It can also be taken by students of the master's programs in "Migration, Diversität und Teilhabe" (Migration, Diversity, and Participation, module MIG-II) and "Germanistik und Interkulturalität/Multilingualität" (German Studies and Interculturality/Multilingualism, module P7).</p>		
Entry requirements:		
Essential: Basic understanding of educational concepts; the capability of reading and discussing complex academic literature in English.		
Qualification Objectives / Competences:		
<p>After completion of the module, the students</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • are familiar with educational theories, concepts, and models within historical, social, and philosophical frameworks; • are familiar with educational research and applied educational concepts in diversified contexts • can critically evaluate the global dimensions of educational policy and research • can outline theoretical and methodological concepts for the analysis of education in modern societies • can identify a variety of actors influencing educational trajectories and reflect on the role of educational institutions and teachers in students' learning and development • can critically analyze how social stratification (e.g, class, ethnicity, gender, intersectionality) produces and reproduces unequal educational opportunities and outcomes 		

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- can evaluate the impact of migration and diversity on schooling processes and policies
- can examine policies and practices aimed at increasing educational equity
- can identify key issues in philosophy of education
- are able to critical assess philosophical questions in education contexts such a reflection of uncertainty, or finding a balance between independent critical thinking and trusting expert knowledge
